Jack came back to visit

MRIS's relatively new Bush School harks back to its earlier incarnation as Nyindamurra Family School, where students such as Jack Garnett experienced classes in the great outdoors.

In 2014, Jack visited the school with his family and shared some of his memories, including "bouncing in the back seat of an old Holden listening to Paul Kelly at full volume as our teacher Greg drives us down to Redgate beach for our daily dose of 'outside learning'."

"I'm not convinced it was a formal lesson plan, but we learnt plenty!"

Jack had seven years at the school, Pre-Primary to Year 6 (1983-1989).

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"I remember the everyday colour and care of Nyindamurra," he said. "It was a safe place where learning was play and play was fun.

"Debbie Doig, Greg, Ben, Marie, Lynn, Wendy—teachers I will never forget.

"Nyindamurra provided what I believe is the core purpose of primary schooling: To provide a social, emotional and physical learning environment that encourages creativity and independence in each student. "Nyindamurra provided the spark to light the flame of learning and prioritised learning from our mistakes ahead of bubble-wrapping us. "I have a continued love of learning and have pursued a variety of undergraduate studies including my first undergraduate course in robotics and computer science, followed by majors in psychology, philosophy and economics.

"A post graduate course in Outdoor Education and subsequent teaching work left me with a deeper understanding of how hard teaching is . . . so I studied for a further three years and became a Paramedic.

"The effort of those who founded Nyindumurra continues to make a positive impact in my life and for that I am so very grateful."
