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### Rationale

Parents are required to complete flexible commitment hours to

- (i) keep fees low; and
- (ii) encourage parent involvement in their child's schooling with resulting improved student achievements.

Parent involvement is the key point of difference in our small family school hence: *Sharing the Learning Journey*.

# Summary

MRIS offers a fantastic and unique opportunity to be engaged and involved in your child's formal education journey. Compulsory parent contribution hours are a key feature in supporting the ongoing sense of MRIS as a family school and to improve student educational outcomes. Studies have shown that increased parental involvement in school improves student outcomes in academic, social and behavioural domains [He & Thompson 2022]. Additionally, the school relies heavily on this participation to reduce school fees.

## Flexible commitment contribution

The school requires <u>10hrs</u> of flexible commitment per parent each term or <u>40hrs</u> per year. From the start of 2025 this will be reduced to 30hrs per year.

Parents or families are required to regularly advise hours completed via the Track It Forward App or the Flexible Commitment Hours Book in the Office. Parents may choose to log their hours individually or as a family.

Parents are invoiced (currently \$10 per hour, revised to \$20 per hour from the end of 2024) if hours are <u>not</u> completed or not logged.

Parents can contribute their hours over the year as individual circumstances permit, although it is expected that all parents contribute hours towards our Annual Art Auction and Bi-Annual Open Day.

Parents who have a baby under 12 months of age are not required to contribute flexible commitment hours, please contact the Office to ensure the appropriate pro-rata adjustment.

For the purpose of calculating hours, a school term ends on the last school day of term and the next term begins the following day, on the first day of school holidays. Hours are not transferable to the following year.

Hours contributed may take the form of parent education, assistance to the teachers, meetings, maintenance of school grounds and buildings, fundraising activities or other activities agreed upon between the school and the family. Please see below for guidance on ways to be involved. Parents who wish to contribute hours by assisting in the classroom <u>must first liaise with the relevant teacher</u> and may only assist with agreement of the teacher.

Families new to the School with only Kindy child/children, may have less opportunity to contribute and thus only 15 hrs per parent is required of them. Families who only attend Little Indies are not required to contribute. Full time teachers who are also have children at the school are not required to formally log parent hours, as it is expected they will contribute in other ways. Their partners, however, are expected to contribute.

Parents may apply to the Principal or the Parent Body Representative in exceptional circumstances to request an adjustment e.g. illness or injury etc.

Parent hours may have specialist skills that they can bring to support the school, please think outside of the box and speak to the Principal or the Parent Body Representative to discuss alternative ways to contribute your flexible commitment hours.

### Ways to be involved

Examples of how parents/families may obtain flexible commitment hours are listed below. They generally fall into the following categories:

**Parent education** – this is necessary to ensure that there is a shared approach to learning between school and home. Uptake is lower than preferred and further ways to encourage involvement e.g. through webinars will be explored. It should be possible to obtain 4-16 hours pa from these activities.

Major fundraisers—including Art Auction, estimated to be from 4 hours pa.

**School activities** – to stay connected including Busy Bee and school events including Disco, AGM, carnivals etc. It should be possible to obtain 10-20 hours pa from these activities.

**Class support** – from class meetings, to fundraising for camp to class activities, between 4-8 hours pa (depending on number of students attending could be double or triple).

**Specialist activities** - Catering Team, Class Coordinators, Subcommittees, Governing Body possible to obtain from 8-48+ hours pa.
